

Entity: Kenny Smith

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Semantic Summary

Veteran British fascist organiser; founder and chairman of the Homeland Party (April 2023), formed when he broke from Mark Collett's Patriotic Alternative — taking most of PA's Scottish branch and much of the West Midlands in the most significant UK far-right split in years — and previously a senior BNP administrator under Nick Griffin. An exponent of the old-guard "sensible nationalism" tradition (careful branding, euphemistic language, electoral ladder strategy), he briefly built Homeland into the largest fascist organisation in Britain at around 1,400 members, with international connections including Germany's AfD. By mid-2026 the party is in terminal decline: Smith's social media silent since March, membership down to an estimated 500, and Homeland absent from the May 2026 Remigration Summit in Porto, eclipsed by Restore Britain. His BNP-PA-Homeland trajectory illustrates the cycling of far-right activists through successive organisational forms.

Role in Ecosystem

Kenny Smith is a veteran far-right organiser who has cycled through the BNP (under Nick Griffin), Patriotic Alternative (under Mark Collett), and finally founded the Homeland Party in 2023. For a brief period, Homeland was the largest fascist organisation in Britain, eclipsing PA — but by mid-2026 the party is in terminal decline, with Smith's social media silent since March.

Smith's significance is as a representative of the old guard of British fascism — the BNP/NF tradition of "sensible nationalism" (careful branding, euphemistic language, electoral ladder strategy). He broke from Collett's PA in 2023, taking most of PA's Scottish branch and much of the West Midlands with him, in what was the most significant split in the UK far-right in years.

The Homeland Party under Smith made international connections with European far-right parties (AfD Germany, etc.), but has now been eclipsed by Restore Britain as the vehicle of choice for the UK far-right. Smith's trajectory — from BNP to PA to Homeland to irrelevance — illustrates the cycling of far-right activists through organisational forms.

- Founded Homeland Party in April 2023 after breaking from Patriotic Alternative
- Previously a senior administrator for the BNP under Nick Griffin
- Homeland briefly had ~1,400 members — the largest fascist organisation in Britain
- Advocated "sensible nationalism" — careful branding and euphemistic language
- By June 2026, Homeland in terminal decline: social media silent since March, no summer camp, members leaving
- Was absent from the May 2026 Remigration Summit in Porto — replaced by Restore Britain figures
- Estimated WhatsApp community only ~500 members (down from 1,400 claimed)
- Homeland Party remains registered with the Electoral Commission but is effectively moribund

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
