- **Met Police open criminal investigation into Reform UK donations — dominates Thursday's front pages** — The Met's Special Enquiry Team is investigating potential offences under the Political Parties, Elections and Referendums Act 2000, folded into an existing inquiry into other donations. It follows a Channel 4 News / Verbatim Investigations undercover film in which two senior Reform aides appeared to suggest a route around electoral law to secure a foreign donation of up to £500,000. Chief of staff Dan Jukes and head of policy James Orr both lost their jobs. The Electoral Commission says it is "considering all relevant information and regulatory steps" in parallel. Reform "denies any wrongdoing and will fully cooperate"; the party calls claims Farage will be interviewed "pure speculation". The Met is also examining payments from a company controlled by deputy leader Richard Tice which received £1m in June 2024. - **Air traffic control failure "was avoidable", Transport Secretary tells Commons** — Heidi Alexander has ordered an independent investigation by the aviation watchdog into Nats, whose systems went down for four hours on Tuesday. More than 2,000 flights have now been cancelled and disruption ran into a second day, hitting around 330,000 passengers. A cyberattack has been ruled out. Nats has apologised for its third major technical fault in three years; the CAA says passengers are unlikely to be entitled to compensation. Airlines including Wizz Air and Ryanair have called for Nats chief Martin Rolfe (11 years in post, 49% state-owned operator) to step down — Metro's front page asks "Ready for departure?". Nats must report back within a week.

- **England's mayors to get power to introduce a tourist tax** — details expected today after Housing Secretary Angela Rayner meets mayors. The "Overnight Visitor Levy" (outlined in the King's Speech in May) will be charged as a percentage of accommodation cost rather than a flat fee, with no theoretical upper limit — ministers believe mayors will not push it too high. Sadiq Khan backs a levy that analysis suggests could raise £350m+ a year for London. UK Hospitality warns of higher holiday costs and a hit to competitiveness.  - **Trump pledges \$5,000 to every adult American if Republicans win November midterms** — announced in a lengthy convention speech in Dallas. He also said the Iran war "won't end until after" the November elections. Separate reporting: public records show Trump gave \$45,000 cash gifts to aide Natalie Harp and two others. - **Burnham vs Badenoch at PMQs: "national security can't come at the expense of social security"** — the PM said the government's commitment to defence is "absolute" and will set a target date for 3% of GDP by 2030 in the spring spending review (Nato 3.5% by 2035 reaffirmed). He rejected a Conservative plan to part-fund defence by taking £4bn from housing benefit, warning of "hundreds of thousands of children in temporary accommodation". The Tories branded Labour the "Welfare Party"; Badenoch says Burnham "said the quiet part out loud". - **Oil hits \$100 a barrel for the first time since July** after US and Houthi strikes. Centcom says it destroyed five Iranian tankers — Kaviz, Charminar, Horizon 1 and Riesco in the Gulf of Oman, plus Derya near Kharg Island. The IRGC claims it hit eight tankers and two warships and launched missiles at US facilities at Muwaffaq Salti Air Base in Jordan; Jordan says it intercepted 20 missiles. The IRGC also plans a new "prohibited zone" for shipping extending beyond the Strait of Hormuz into the Arabian Sea. The Strait was effectively closed earlier in the conflict — 20% of world oil and LNG normally passes through it. <https://www.bbc.co.uk/news/articles/cyvznqypz0yo>
 - **Philippines ferry fire: five dead and 86 missing** — the MV June Aster, carrying 117 passengers and 17 crew from Manila to Coron, caught fire at 18:45 local time on Wednesday; the blaze was still burning on Thursday. Preliminary interviews suggest it started in the cargo hold; some passengers were not wearing life vests.  - **Anthropic held back its frontier AI model from British checks** — the FT reports the company omitted the UK's AI Security Institute from testing of Claude Mythos 5.1, giving access to vetted US bodies only, prompting alarm in Whitehall over US AI protectionism. The Daily Star leads on ex-Anthropic researcher Jacob Coxon, who quit warning the tech could kill all humans by 2030 ("Hasta la vista").
