? Top Story — Reform's £72m and the Lords showdown

The House of Lords debates changes to the law on political donations this afternoon, after Reform UK banked £72m from two crypto billionaires inside 24 hours.

- **Ben Delo** and **Christopher Harborne** — both British, both having spent time living overseas — gave **£36m each**. Reform's total for 2026 now stands at roughly £86m.
- The government is seeking to change the rules on donations from **British expats**, including a **£100,000 cap backdated to 25 March**. It has also proposed a minimum residency period after a donor returns to the UK.
- **Lord Wills** told Radio 4's *Westminster Hour* he will amend the bill so UK-resident donations are capped too.
- **Richard Tice** (Reform deputy leader) says the move shows Labour is "terrified" and accuses ministers of trying to "**retrospectively introduce legislation in order to significantly disadvantage another political party**" — a point echoed by **Zia Yusuf**, who called it confiscation of donations that were lawful when received.
- **Angela Rayner** said the changes would apply retrospectively and anyone non-compliant would "have to return that money". **Robert Jenrick** insists the donations are "entirely in line with the law as it is".
- **Sharon Graham** (Unite): a limit on individual donations is necessary — "billionaires splashing out millions" is not the same as "everyday workers giving 10p a week". **Paul Nowak** (TUC) pushed back on the comparison: "trade union money is the cleanest, most transparent money in British politics."
- The **Met Police** inquiry into alleged overseas donations continues; the government has set up a taskforce on "mega-donors".

Celtic summit in Cardiff

The first ministers of **Wales, Scotland and Northern Ireland meet in Cardiff** — the first time since devolution that all three devolved governments are led by parties that want to leave the UK.

- **Rhun ap Iorwerth** hosts the SNP's **John Swinney** and Sinn Féin's **Michelle O'Neill**; Sinn Féin president **Mary Lou McDonald** also attends, and ap Iorwerth and Swinney will sign an agreement on "future collaboration in areas of shared interest".
- ap Iorwerth: "a new political landscape is emerging, with a growing recognition that the Westminster model is no longer working". Swinney called the momentum behind constitutional change "undeniable".
- **Emma Little-Pengelly** (DUP deputy first minister) criticised O'Neill for attending.
- The summit follows the Commons exchange in which **Andy Burnham** appeared to say a second Scottish referendum could follow the same trigger as a **border poll** in Northern Ireland. No 10 later insisted there was no policy change and another vote remains "off limits".

AI and human rights

The **Joint Committee on Human Rights** published a 100-page report calling for a new **AI Bill** to "address the scale and seriousness" of human rights threats.

- Chair **Alex Sobel** (Labour): "Nowhere in the world, including the UK, has a current legislative and regulatory approach to AI that is fit for purpose."
- The JCHR wants a "**single, independent AI oversight body**" on a statutory basis, risk-classified regulation across the AI lifecycle, and outright prohibitions on some uses (subliminal techniques, inappropriate profiling/biometric use).
- Follows **Dario Amodei's** (Anthropic) call to slow AI development, with **Sam Altman** and **Elon Musk** both agreeing — and **Donald Trump** rejecting a brake, citing the race with China.

Other political headlines

- **Rayner: only a "slim chance"** the 1.5m-new-homes target for England will be met.
- **Deep-fried food banned** under new English school dinner rules; the Telegraph reads it as "no ice cream and **compulsory lentils**".
- **Burnham: a "culture shift" is needed in how the UK does business** — No 10 hosts entrepreneurs and local mayors on Monday.

- **Tourist tax row:** ~800 pub, restaurant and hotel leaders urge Burnham to **cut VAT from 20% to 10%**, days after councils were handed power to levy visitor charges. The government says levies will be a percentage of accommodation cost so low-cost holidays stay low.
 - **Rail passengers get an automatic right to switch operators for free** when trains are cancelled.
 - **Rise in abuse of election candidates** is "changing politics" in England.
 - **George Osborne calls for the UK to rejoin the EU customs union.**
 - **Register of British Slave Traders:** three-year project names up to **10,500 investors** in the transatlantic slave trade, tracing links to institutions still operating (Guardian exclusive).
 - A director who oversaw **Grenfell cost-cutting** has been given a senior council housing role.
 - **TUC conference** opens; **rent rises set to speed up** in a gloomy forecast for tenants.
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? World / International

Ukraine & Russia

- **A Russian drone hit a Ukrainian train at a station on the Polish border**, shortly after **Boris Johnson** and top European officials had passed through. Johnson's own service had departed earlier than scheduled due to the attack threat. He told the Daily Mail the strike shows the "bared teeth of a cornered rat"; the Sun led on "Boris flees Vlad drone blitz". **Canada offered air-defence support** as **Zelenskyy** visited.

Europe

- **Sweden's election is too close to call** — the centre-left bloc led by just a single seat with most votes counted.
- **Turkish police detained dozens** in raids on gay bars and the homes of LGBTQ+ activists.
- **Trump ended his two-day Ireland visit** by promising to **remove all Irish whiskey tariffs**, having earlier doubled down on support for a united Ireland.

Middle East

- **Saudi Arabia shut a key East-West oil pipeline**, blaming drones launched from Iraq; the **Houthis claimed an attack on a Saudi base** as fighting with Yemeni forces flared.
- **Gaza:** a pregnant woman was among more than 10 killed in Israeli attacks; an Israeli minister threatened to strip film-makers of citizenship over a Gaza documentary.

Asia & Pacific

- **Indonesian ferry capsized in the Java Sea** — six dead, ~130 missing. A **Vanuatu ferry sank** in rough seas (one dead, 30+ missing), and the death toll from a **Philippines ferry fire** rose to 35.
- **North Korea has built a new uranium enrichment facility**, the UN's nuclear watchdog says.
- **BRICS summit in New Delhi**: Xi Jinping got a red carpet amid a thaw in India-China relations, though the Iran war has exposed divisions in the bloc.
- **Nepal**: rescuers found two more people alive after flash floods, as Kathmandu called for climate compensation from big polluters.

Americas & Africa

- **Trump downplayed warnings of AI risk**, citing rivalry with China — the FT's lead.
- **CIA released dozens of pre-9/11 presidential daily briefs** on Bin Laden and al-Qaida.
- **Rubio signalled a shift to working with allies** on the drug trade as the latest boat strike killed three; an **Ecuadorian gang was designated a terrorist group** by the US.
- **George Chuvalo**, the legendary Canadian heavyweight, **died aged 89**.
- **Uganda**: the burial of King Oyo took place as a succession dispute ignited and the military chief said the country would withdraw from the Invictus Games "out of respect for King Charles".

- **Six months without bin collections** has prompted calls for **council tax refunds** on a new housing estate.
- **New Welsh constituency names could be changed — again**.
- **Record mountain rescue callouts are "not sustainable"**, rescuers warn.
- **Summer wildfires caused "catastrophic hidden damage"**, scientists say — as crews continue to battle a south Wales wildfire ("It's been very tough").
- **Drivers in Wales face fines of up to £150** for leaving engines idling while stationary under new rules.
- The **First Minister rejected Reform-style mega donations**, and separately hailed a "new political landscape" ahead of the Cardiff summit.
- **£70m of taxpayers' money spent on a Gibraltar-sized rail testing centre that has never been built**.
- A man serving an **indefinite sentence is set for release after 21 years** for a phone robbery.
- **Huw Edwards** thanked 1,000 subscribers, saying he feared the public would question his "right to speak".
- **Language campaigners** warn "secret" talks over BBC cuts threaten S4C's digital independence; a Welsh local newspaper's website is going behind a paywall.

- **Bryn Terfel's** parents got front-row seats for his emotional homecoming; a Welsh stargazing spot made Europe's top 10; a council crematorium became the first in Wales to win a top environmental award.

A warm, humid Monday gives way to a cooler, wetter, windier week.

- **Monday is the warmest day:** above 20C widely, up to **26C** where the sun breaks through in central and southern England. Cloudy for many, with rain on west coasts and hills.
 - A **strengthening jet stream** (speeds above 170mph by late week) brings deeper low-pressure systems — spells of rain and brisk winds, with the potential for **minor disruption towards next weekend**.
 - By **Thursday** winds turn westerly/north-westerly: **14-16C** in Scotland and Northern Ireland, **17-20C** in England and Wales.
 - High pressure may build again for the **last week of September**, but there is currently **nothing to indicate a heatwave**.
