Thirlwall Inquiry findings into Lucy Letby published today

The findings of the public inquiry into how Lucy Letby was able to repeatedly murder and harm babies are published later today. The inquiry examined what happened at the Countess of Chester Hospital between 2015 and 2016, where Letby worked as a neonatal nurse. It was not tasked with re-examining her guilt — only how concerns raised about her were handled by the hospital, and whether action could have been taken sooner.

- Letby, now 36, is serving **15 whole-life prison terms** for murdering seven babies and attempting to murder seven others (including one baby she tried to murder twice).
- She was moved off the neonatal unit to administrative duties in **July 2016** after consultants complained to the executive team — the inquiry examined whether alarm bells should have rung earlier, for example after three babies died in quick succession in **June 2015**.
- Led by **Lady Justice Thirlwall**; six months of evidence, thousands of documents, cost **over £18.5m**. Expect findings of significant safeguarding failures and NHS-wide recommendations.
- The **Criminal Cases Review Commission** — the only body able to send the case back to the Court of Appeal — says it will pay close attention. Letby has twice been denied permission to appeal.
- Her defence lawyer **Mark McDonald** told Newsnight he has submitted "nearly 30 expert reports to the CCRC", more than "any other case" in its history. Two experts (Prof Geoff Chase, Helen Shannon) quit his team on Monday.

State pension likely to rise by £488 a year in April

Average wage growth including bonuses slowed to **3.9%** between May and July (ONS), which — thanks to the triple lock — sets the likely uprating:

Pension type	Likely weekly rate	Likely annual rate	Increase
Flat-rate state pension (reached SPA after Apr 2016)	£250.70	£13,036.40	+£488
Old basic state pension (reached SPA before Apr 2016)	£192.10	£9,989.20	+£374.40

- If confirmed, the flat rate passes the **£12,570 personal allowance** and becomes liable for income tax. Labour has pledged pensioners relying solely on the state pension won't be chased for returns.
- **Resolution Foundation** (Ruth Curtice): the triple lock creates a "ratchet effect" — pensioner living standards have grown three times faster than typical workers' over 20 years.
- Not confirmed until **September inflation** data next month. Inflation currently 2.9%, not expected to exceed the wages figure.
- ONS labour market: unemployment unchanged at **4.9%**, but vacancies and payroll employees fell.

Reform UK's £72m donations row rolls on

Reform announced over the weekend it had received **two donations of £36m each** — the largest in British political history — from British businessmen **Ben Delo** (crypto billionaire) and **Christopher Harborne**, both of whom have until recently lived abroad.

- **Farage** says there is "no question" they are legal "as it stands", refuses to detail residency, and calls retrospective criminalisation impossible: "This cannot be." He threatened to retaliate by **limiting trade union donations** if elected PM.
- The **Representation of the People Bill**, debated in the Lords on Monday, caps donations from Britons living overseas at **£100,000**, and requires donors to have been UK-registered by **25 March 2026** to escape the cap. Returnees must wait at least a year before giving more than £100k.
- **TUC** conference in the same week: general secretary **Paul Nowak** branded Reform a "party for sale" and the donations "a crisis for democracy"; **Unite's Sharon Graham** wants a £500k-£1m cap on UK-resident donations. Nowak: "no similarity between care workers chipping in a few quid a year through their union and a party bought and paid for by billionaires."

- **Sir Philip Rycroft**, whose March report into foreign interference prompted the change, said he sees "no reason why we should have these mega sums of money coming into British politics" and floated capping *all* donations.
- **Tom Tugendhat** (Con): avoid "Americanisation of politics". **Lisa Smart** (Lib Dem): emergency legislation. **Greens**: Labour should "find its spine and support a tight cap".
- Chris Mason's analysis: "Row over Reform's mega donations has mileage in it yet."

"Westminster's time is coming to an end" — nationalist first ministers

For the first time since devolution, Wales, Scotland and Northern Ireland all have first ministers who want to leave the UK. Rhun ap Iorwerth (Plaid Cymru), John Swinney (SNP) and Michelle O'Neill (Sinn Féin), plus Sinn Féin president Mary Lou McDonald, signed a memorandum of understanding on Monday.

- The MoU: "there could be no clearer sign that Westminster's time is coming to an end... No Westminster government has the right to block democracy."
 - Swinney and O'Neill called for referendums; **ap Iorwerth declined to give a timetable**. Plaid has ruled out an independence referendum before the **2030 Senedd election**.
 - Swinney described **Andy Burnham** as "the last prime minister of the United Kingdom".
 - Separately, the Welsh and Scottish governments signed the **Cytundeb Caerdydd / Cardiff Agreement** on future collaboration and joint pressure on the UK government over funding and powers.
 - DUP deputy first minister **Emma Little-Pengelly** accused O'Neill of trying to "weaponise the role of first minister". Labour and Reform accused Plaid of wanting to break up the UK.

- **Burnham cancels engagements after death of father** — the PM has withdrawn from scheduled appearances.
- **Former top civil servant received pay-off of nearly £860,000** — Lord Wormald's exit package draws scrutiny.
- **Lord Blunkett: farm tax a mistake** — calls for a Burnham "rural reset".
- **PM urges "culture shift" in how the UK does business** on the day the TUC conference opened (1,391 comments).

prosecution with a maximum £1,000 fine. Religious, cultural, health, work, weather and personal-safety coverings exempt. Stafford Borough Council has a similar PSPO; West Midlands community leaders want to follow.

- **Pubs in England and Wales to allow digital ID apps to prove age** — voluntary, technology-agnostic scheme; Yoti-style apps require a face-match log-in and issue time-limited QR codes. Digital minister **Stephanie Peacock** says drinkers won't need to "hand over sensitive personal information". UKHospitality's **Allen Simpson** calls it "a positive step". Could later cover tobacco and vapes.
- **Harry and Meghan to have security review and children change school** amid security concerns.
- **Assisted dying bill rejected** by MPs — analysis of why it failed this time (earlier in the week).
- **Parliament:** House of Lords business 14–17 September includes the donations bill debate.

- **30% business rates cut for high street hospitality and leisure** — announced 00:01 today by **First Minister Rhun ap Iorwerth** and **Finance Minister Elin Jones** at the Radyr Tap, Cardiff. Cut applies from **1 April 2027**; small and medium businesses with a rateable value below **£51,000** benefit, change fully funded by higher rates on the largest businesses. FM: this gives businesses "the confidence to invest, grow and keep serving the communities that rely on them."
- **Leaders of Wales and Scotland sign Cytundeb Caerdydd (Cardiff Agreement)** — plans for future collaboration between the two governments (Monday 14 Sep).

Russia / Ukraine / Nato

- **Nato fighter jet shot down a drone that entered Lithuanian airspace** shortly after midnight. Lithuanian officials say it likely came from **Belarus** and was downed near Pratkunai village, southern Lithuania, near Kaunas. A drone alert was issued for Vilnius and the surrounding region.
- **Poland scrambled fighter jets** in the early hours as Russia launched its latest attack on Ukraine using **jet-powered drones** across the whole country. At least some drones likely crossed Ukraine's borders.
- **Zelensky** says Kyiv is ready to support a US-led proposal for a **Russia-Ukraine ceasefire protecting energy sites** — but only if Washington can ensure Moscow is genuinely ready to comply.
- Poland separately said Nato "would defeat Russia quickly if we took our gloves off".

US & AI

- **Trump says AI safety fears are a "hoax"** as he rejects calls for greater safeguards. This follows **Anthropic co-founder Jack Clark** telling the BBC that AI is getting more powerful "by the day" and that a **"kill switch" should be mandatory**.
- **US confirms for the first time that it has deployed space weapons** (Pituffik Space Base, Greenland, pictured).
- **AI regulation faces political deadlock** in Congress as calls grow for action; **China** criticises the idea it is in "malicious competition" over AI and **tightens travel**

restrictions for its citizens.

- **Supreme Court blocks Trump's plan to restrict mail-in ballots.**
- **Donald Trump Jr and Bettina Trump** say a Putin ally paid for some wedding festivities as a "gift".

- **Legendary costume designer Bob Mackie dies aged 87.**
 - **Emmy Awards 2026:** Welsh actor **Matthew Rhys makes history with a double win**; other winners include Noah Wyle and Allison Janney; Taylor Swift made a surprise appearance in a sketch.

UK set to turn cooler as unsettled weather continues (Simon King, BBC Lead Weather Presenter)

- Much of the UK feels **cooler from today** as more changeable weather moves in; rain spells, especially northern and western parts.
 - Cold front brings rain across **England and Wales** for a time; fresher north-westerly winds then bring showers — some heavy — to Scotland, Northern Ireland and north-west England and Wales.
 - **Maximum temperatures 17-22C**, around five degrees lower than Monday. That's closer to the seasonal average.
 - **Drier, brighter interlude on Wednesday**, then more unsettled again; 15-20C. **Overnight lows 8-12C** — early commuters may need extra layers.
 - From **Saturday**, a west/south-westerly wind pulls temperatures back above average, with signs of high pressure and drier, brighter spells — but a **September heatwave is looking increasingly unlikely**.
 - Context: a "historic" El Niño has left the Atlantic unusually quiet and set a new hurricane season record; El Niño is likely to cause a wetter and warmer-than-normal autumn.
