? Top Story: 30% business rates cut for pubs, hotels, gyms and cinemas

Pubs, cafés, restaurants, bars, hotels, gyms, cinemas and theatres across Wales will see their business rates bills cut by 30% under a permanent change announced by the Welsh Government at 00:01 this morning — funded by a small increase in the rates paid by Wales' biggest properties. First Minister **Rhun ap Iorwerth** and Finance Minister **Elin Jones** launched the policy at the Radyr Tap in Cardiff, where Jones pulled two pints for the cameras (landlord **Phil Newbould** reckoned her technique "could do with some work", but called the cut "helpful"). The 30% reduction applies from **1 April 2027** to small and medium-sized properties with a rateable value **below £51,000**. It replaces the 15% temporary relief currently in place for food and drink hospitality. Sectors covered: **food and drink hospitality** (pubs, restaurants, cafés, bars, food courts, licensed clubs, live music venues); **visitor accommodation** (hotels, guest houses, hostels); and **leisure** (cinemas, theatres, libraries, museums, gyms). Retail shops keep the support they already get through the lower multiplier.

- **How it's paid for.** The scope of the lower multiplier is expanded to those sectors; the revenue is offset by a marginal rise in the higher multiplier applied to the highest-value properties in Wales — including some hotels and large sites such as supermarkets. The gap between the higher and standard multipliers rises to about **2p in the pound**, less than a penny more than now. Ministers say the overall contribution business rates make to funding public services is unchanged and local authority funding will not fall.
- **The FM:** "Our high streets are the heartbeat of communities right across Wales, and the businesses that fill them deserve our backing... This 30% cut to rates for pubs, cafés,

gyms, hotels and so many other local favourites is about giving those businesses the confidence to invest, grow and keep serving the communities that rely on them." He told the BBC it delivered the government's "promise to rebalance the way business rates work" and was "the earliest point realistically we can do this".

- **Elin Jones:** "This significant and permanent change will make a real difference... We've taken a balanced approach, ensuring this support is affordable while protecting the vital contribution business rates make to our public services." She said it was right that the "burden will fall on the bigger businesses", amounting to around 1p in every £1.
- **Industry reaction. UK Hospitality Cymru** director **David Chapman** welcomed it as "the beginnings of a change which I hope will permanently enable our businesses to look at growth", but warned running a venue was like "plate spinning when you're riding an exercise bike" given VAT, energy and National Insurance costs. Newbould said the cut was "not as huge as it sounds" — about **£3,000 a year** across his two pubs — and renewed calls for a VAT cut, which is reserved to Westminster. **Oliver Banks**, who opened café and wine bar Kindred in Cardiff five months ago, called it "fantastic" and said it should give him "a little bit more wiggle room" on food and drink prices.
- **Next steps.** Regulations come forward in the autumn; subject to Senedd approval the change takes effect from 1 April 2027. Exact multiplier values for 2027-28 will be confirmed in budget preparations after the UK Autumn Budget. The **Town Centres Taskforce** will consider what further tailored support individual town centres need.
- **Context.** In July, Prime Minister **Andy Burnham** announced a **20% cut** in business rates for pubs, social clubs and live music venues in England, also from April 2027. The UK government said that since rates are devolved, the Welsh cut also means extra funding for the Welsh government to allocate.

? The Cardiff Agreement — and "Westminster's time is coming to an end"

?? Cytundeb Caerdydd signed

The First Ministers of Wales and Scotland signed the Cytundeb Caerdydd — the Cardiff Agreement — at 15:00 yesterday, committing their governments to work together on seven areas of shared interest.

Ap Iorwerth and **John Swinney** set out cooperation on: tackling child poverty and improving outcomes for children and families; cost of living pressures and living standards; sustainable,

inclusive economic growth; fiscal arrangements; climate change and resilience; international engagement, including with the EU; and language, culture, media and sport.

- Ap Iorwerth: "While Wales and Scotland are on different constitutional journeys, we both share a commitment to strong, accountable devolved government... We share a belief that our people should decide their own future, and that the Union isn't working fairly for either nation."
- Swinney: "An important moment in the history of devolution... The new era of co-operation... will be underpinned by a shared belief that the people of Scotland and Wales are best placed to decide their own constitutional future."
- The agreement is **not legally binding**. At a second press conference Swinney **declined to support reform of the Barnett Formula** — the funding system Welsh ministers have long argued disadvantages Wales but which is generally thought to favour Scotland. Ap Iorwerth said there were "flexibilities that Scotland already have right now as a minimum to be handed to Wales".

? Nationalist leaders' declaration — Swinney now aiming for a referendum by 2031

Compact update on yesterday's summit: the memorandum of understanding between Plaid Cymru, the SNP and Sinn Féin was signed in Cardiff Bay, with all four leaders declaring "there could be no clearer sign that Westminster's time is coming to an end".

- The MoU says: "No Westminster government has the right to block democracy or undermine the principle that our people will decide their own future... We recognise that our parties have different constitutional positions and that each nation will determine its own future in its own way and in its own time." It asks the UK Government to "prepare for, plan and facilitate constitutional change in each jurisdiction".
- **New detail:** Swinney said he wants Scots to have "a choice on their constitutional future" **within this Holyrood term, which ends in 2031**, and has previously said a referendum could come as soon as **2028**. He noted the Scottish Parliament now has **73 pro-independence MSPs** (with the Greens) — an increase of one, though the pro-independence vote share fell to about 41% — and said polling showed a small majority in favour. He called Burnham "the last prime minister of the United Kingdom".
- **Ap Iorwerth gave no Welsh timetable.** Asked to clarify what the MoU meant for Wales, he said it was "up to the people of Wales to decide its own future" and, pressed further: "The timescale will be set by the people of Wales when they are persuaded. My job is to persuade." Plaid has ruled out a referendum before the 2030 Senedd election. He said the "current status quo is not tenable" and called for a fundamental redesign of the UK's constitutional framework, with independent nations working together.
- **Reaction.** Burnham's spokesman said the PM "believes strongly in the union" and is focused on easing household finances "rather than engaging in constitutional debates or

further referendums". Scottish Secretary **Douglas Alexander** said independence and a referendum were "off limits... a distraction". Reform UK Scotland leader **Malcolm Offord** called it "fantasy politics"; Scottish Conservative leader **Russell Findlay** said many would "recoil". Labour and Reform accused Plaid of wanting to break up the UK; **Emma Little-Pengelly** (DUP) again accused O'Neill of "weaponis[ing] the role of first minister".

? Restore Britain: "rolling back devolution"

Restore Britain leader Rupert Lowe has announced a policy of "rolling back devolution" in response to the Cardiff summit, posting on Facebook (5,000+ likes): "We will restore democratic accountability and strengthen the Union. Whilst ensuring a fair say for the Scottish, the Welsh, the Northern Irish – and yes, the English."

He contrasted "accepting the status quo, and its endorsement of ever greater fragmentation" with "a determined effort to bring our family back together through rolling back failed devolution", and said a **full policy paper is "being developed"** — so at present the policy exists only as a social media post. *(Nation.Cymru, 15 Sep)*

? Reform Wales leader questions Nation.Cymru's public funding

Reform UK Wales leader Dan Thomas has tabled a written question at the Senedd implying Nation.Cymru made a false allegation — a characterisation the site's chief executive says goes far beyond what the press regulator actually ruled.

Thomas asked Culture Minister **Heledd Fychan** whether it remains appropriate for Nation.Cymru to receive public funding in light of IPSO complaint 06516-25, and what standards of accuracy and editorial governance the Welsh Government expects of publicly supported organisations.

- The complaint concerned a 2025 opinion piece that said: "Multiple sources have told Nation.Cymru that the man behind [the Doge Wales X account] is Ross England." England — the former Welsh Conservative candidate whose disclosure of a complainant's sexual history collapsed a 2019 rape trial at Cardiff Crown Court, and who was later dropped as a candidate — denied running the account.

- Nation.Cymru CEO **Mark Mansfield**: IPSO "did not find that this allegation was false. It did not rule that England was not behind the account and did not find that Nation.Cymru had fabricated its sources." Rather, IPSO found Nation.Cymru presented the claim as "an unproven allegation made by multiple sources", and upheld accuracy breaches because **England's denial was not included when published** and the subsequent correction was not offered promptly enough. Nation.Cymru had offered a right of reply and to amend the article.

?? "I didn't know who they were" — Reform MS defends far-right meeting

Gŵyr Abertawe MS Francesca O'Brien says she did not know who Voice of Wales were when she chaired a meeting at which the group's leaders spoke.

O'Brien discussed the October meeting — held with parents over claims, amplified online by Voice of Wales, about religious education at Sea View Community Primary School in Mayhill — on the Faith Jarvis podcast. Attendees included Voice of Wales leaders **Stan Robinson** and **Dan Morgan**, and far-right activist **Peter May**. Asked about the group's far-right designation, O'Brien smiled: "What is far-right?"

- She said her ignorance was because she does not watch the news or listen to political podcasts: "I hadn't even heard of the Voice of Wales... I didn't even know what they looked like." A Conservative source told Nation.Cymru it was "inconceivable" she didn't know of the group given it operated inside her own Senedd constituency.
- O'Brien, who received significant Voice of Wales support during her campaign and publicly thanked the group, said the "racist" label had become "irrelevant" to her, and dismissed Channel 4's undercover investigation into Reform officials and foreign donations as "irrelevant".

? Striking health visitors call on the First Minister to honour a pre-election pledge

Around 100 health visitors at Cwm Taf Morgannwg University Health Board have written an open letter to Rhun ap Iorwerth urging him to intervene in their dispute, which is now in its eighth month.

- The workers have been on continuous industrial action since **February** over whether the role should sit at NHS **Band 6 or Band 7**; **Unite** says some are underpaid by as much as **£9,000 a year**.

- Unite general secretary **Sharon Graham**: "Unite is calling on Plaid Cymru to honour its promise it made to bring the dispute to an end. Otherwise, the question has to be asked, did Plaid lie?" Ap Iorwerth signed an open letter before becoming First Minister backing the upgrade to Band 7.
- The health visitors **overwhelmingly rejected** the board's offer of a one-off payment of more than **£5,000** last month — 99% of those voting said no — and say the board should instead move them to Band 7 (Band 6 salary reaches £48,117; Unite argues the difference is around £9,000).
- **Impact**: between March and May 2025, **6,140** visits were carried out; in the same three months this year, under the strike, that fell to **909**. The workers plan to demonstrate outside the Senedd this week.
- Health Minister **Mabon ap Gwynfor** has held talks with board chairman **Jonathan Morgan** and called for both sides to return to negotiations; the Welsh Government says it recognises staff concerns and that last month's offer "does represent progress".

?? Record Senedd turnout — but abuse and misinformation are rising

Turnout at May's Senedd election reached a record 51.7% — the first time it has passed 50% — according to new Electoral Commission research, which also flags serious concerns about candidate abuse and misinformation.

- **94%** of voters were satisfied with the process of voting, **86%** were confident the election was run well, **99%** found the ballot paper easy to complete and **97%** knew the election was happening (YouGov survey of 1,771 adults in Wales, 8 May–1 June).
- But **54%** of Senedd election candidates said they had experienced harassment, intimidation or threats, with women more likely to report abuse.
- More than half of respondents said they had seen **misinformation** during the campaign, and **12%** said they had encountered **deepfake** material.
- Confusion over the new system persists: **31%** were not confident they understood how it works and **17%** did not know the voting system had changed. Only **35%** of 16–17-year-olds said they had learned anything in school or college about voting or how Wales' democracy works.
- **Rhydian Thomas**, head of the Electoral Commission in Wales: "Without improvements to candidate safety, there is a significant risk that people will be put off standing in future elections."

? Digital proof of age now valid for alcohol sales in Wales

From today, pubs, bars, restaurants and other licensed venues across Wales and England can accept digital proof of age from certified providers — a QR code to scan, or a phone tapped against a compatible reader.

- The rules follow a 2024 consultation in which **72%** of respondents backed digital identity for alcohol age checks. The scheme is **voluntary**: venues are not required to accept it and physical ID remains valid.
- Digital Government Minister **Stephanie Peacock** said drinkers would no longer need to "hand over sensitive personal information such as your name or address just to prove your age". **UKHospitality** chief executive **Allen Simpson** called it "a positive step"; **techUK** welcomed it as a practical use of the UK's £2bn digital verification sector.
- Note: this is a UK-wide statutory change that applies in Wales — the Welsh Government is not the legislating body.

- **Michael Sheen says the FM snubbed him over toxic pollution claims** — Sheen told the Welsh Affairs Committee he invited ap Iorwerth to watch *Buried with Michael Sheen* before broadcast; "unfortunately, that offer was not taken up". - **PISA critique:** Nation.Cymru carries an academic's claim that **England's 2025 PISA scores may have been artificially inflated** by selective exclusion of lower-attaining pupils (Prof **Paul Frijters**, who says adjusting for sample selectivity would put England "on the same level as Scotland" — and on a par with Wales). The Department for Education said OECD is responsible for PISA comparisons; the Welsh Government said its priority is "to understand the evidence and drive the improvements that will help every learner in Wales reach their potential". ? Officer who punched a suspect nine times faces misconduct hearing

PC Richard Williams used unreasonable force on multiple occasions during the arrest of Steven Clark in Porthmadog, a misconduct hearing in Colwyn Bay has been told. Williams faces **eight allegations**, including using a headlock or "choker", unreasonable use of incapacitant spray, using handcuffs to cause pain, and throwing or dropping Clark into a police van. He denies wrongdoing and was **cleared** of assault and intentional strangulation at a Caernarfon trial in 2025.

- Body-worn camera footage and bystander phone video were played. The hearing was told Clark "is punched by Williams nine times in the face or head" — "nine pretty quick punches", with no pause for reflection — and that the suspect said he "could not breathe". The case was **adjourned until today (Tuesday)**.

? Driver who killed a Team GB triathlete loses deportation appeal

Vasile Barbu, 50, jailed for causing the death of triathlete Rebecca Comins by dangerous driving, has lost his appeal against deportation. Barbu drove straight into the back of Comins' bike on the A40 near Raglan in June 2022 while delivering furniture to Calais, rather than moving into an empty lane of the dual carriageway. Comins, 52, of Monmouthshire, was nine minutes into a cycling time trial.

- Immigration judge **Ian Boyes**: "The nature of the offending is important. This was not an accident. It was not a slight misjudgement. It was committed using a vehicle which should not have been on the road." Barbu's van was found unfit for the road and overloaded, increasing braking distances and reducing steering ability.
- Barbu, who moved to Britain in 2002 and ran the Old Pandy pub, argued removal would be "unduly harsh". The judge found his children are adults and the "very significant public interest in deportation outweighs" his private and family life considerations. Comins' family said they were "so proud of what she achieved in her life". *(BBC Wales — Rowenna Hoskin, 14 Sep)*

?? Pontnewynydd inquest opened and adjourned

An inquest has been opened and adjourned into the death of Anthony David Jones, 56, who died after reports of violent disorder between two motorcycle gangs in Pontnewynydd near Pontypool.

- Jones, an NVQ assessor from Brecon, was taken to the University Hospital of Wales in Cardiff on **6 August** after injuries sustained in a fracas in Heol yr Ysbyty. He was unconscious and unresponsive, had suffered a head injury, and **died the following day**.
- Gwent Police's senior coroner **Caroline Saunders** heard that the post-mortem is ongoing and the death remains the subject of a **criminal investigation**; the inquest will be adjourned until those inquiries conclude, before a decision on whether it should resume.
- *(Background: Gwent Police believe members of two rival Outlaw Motorcycle Clubs were involved. A 40-year-old man from Torfaen was arrested on suspicion of murder in August, and 25 men have been arrested in total. Jones' family paid tribute to a "much-loved husband and devoted dad", known to his grandchildren as "Grumpy".)*

? Months of disruption as gas mains are replaced in Llandaff North

Wales & West Utilities began upgrading gas pipes in the Station Road area of Llandaff North yesterday (14 Sep), with temporary traffic lights and phased side-street closures running until 18 December. The works are being sequenced ahead of Cardiff Council's planned resurfacing of Station Road so the new surface isn't dug up again. Junction-by-junction: three-way lights at Church Road/Heol Don (14–27 Sep); four-way lights at Maplewood Avenue (21 Sep–4 Oct); two-way lights near Hilton Place (5–11 Oct) and Hazelhurst Road (12–18 Oct); Ty Mawr junction

? Concerns over the future of S4C Clic

Cymdeithas yr Iaith Gymraeg has raised concerns that S4C's standalone digital platform, S4C Clic, is being "pushed to the margins", after a series of freedom-of-information requests to S4C and the BBC.

- The campaign group points to the partnership agreement between S4C and the BBC earlier this year, which gives S4C content a more prominent place on **iPlayer**.
- S4C rejects the claim: "S4C Clic yn parhau i fod yn flaenoriaeth" — Clic remains a priority — and says its digital-first strategy is about drawing more viewers to Welsh-language content. Chief executive **Geraint Evans** says monthly S4C viewers via iPlayer have risen **25%** since the deal, from 200,000 to 250,000.
- S4C's most recent annual report put **S4C Clic** at **25,700 monthly users**.

Fifteen members of Porthmadog's Clwb Rhwyfo Madog rowed 26km along the Seine in Paris to mark the club's 25th anniversary, taking part in the Traversée de Paris on 13 September — 12 rowing and three coxing, with two Celtic longboats plus a hired *yolette*. ? Fridges are piling up — and a Newport Docks closure is part of the problem

The Local Government Association has warned that a mountain of broken fridges is building in waste centres across England and Wales, as this year's heatwaves push white goods to breaking point — and councils say there is not enough recycling capacity to cope.

- The crunch follows the **liquidation last year of a major fridge recycling centre at Newport Docks**, which left more than **80,000 fridges and freezers stranded**. Two other centres have closed in recent years.
- Fridges must be degassed before processing and their foam insulation is hazardous, so they cannot go through standard metal recycling lines — sites holding them need environmental permits or registered exemptions.
- Councils from Bradford to Gloucestershire, Durham and Nottinghamshire are among **26 that have suspended fridge collections** this month, adding to financial pressure on local authorities.

? Caerphilly workforce firm completes £3.75m buyout

ALS Managed Services, which trades as ALS People, has secured £3.75m from the Development Bank of Wales for a second management buyout, as it looks to expand across the UK. The Caerphilly-based company supplies and manages temporary workers in recycling, warehousing, distribution and manufacturing, and says turnover has risen from **£13.3m to more than £60m** since the 2018 buyout, with staff numbers doubled.
