? Top Story: Reform's leadership vacuum — nominations close today and members don't get a vote

Dan Thomas, who quit as Reform UK's Wales leader on Tuesday after his arrest, walked into his party's Senedd group meeting in Cardiff Bay in person on Wednesday as colleagues met to work out how to replace him — and his chief whip made clear the party has no plans to suspend him.

- **Chief whip Llyr Powell** said removing the whip — which would effectively leave Thomas sitting as an independent MS — had not been considered: "Dan was completely transparent with us after what happened. Right now, Dan Thomas is a member of our group. He had a right to be there today." He added: "Unlike other people I don't assume guilt until you know an investigation finishes. I think that's completely wrong." There is "an office here for Dan if that is where casework is being held", he said, because "the people of his constituency expect him to be doing the job that he's elected to do".
- **The contest:** nominations close **today (Thursday)**. Party members are not expected to get a vote on who becomes Wales leader — Reform's **33 Senedd members** will decide in a secret ballot if there is more than one candidate. Powell, who did not rule out standing himself ("I don't want to lie to the media" but no papers submitted), and interim leader **Helen Jenner** are thought to be the potential candidates. **James Evans MS** ruled himself out on Wednesday despite claiming majority group support. A party official from London

oversaw Wednesday's meeting.

- **Farage's blessing:** Powell said the group has Nigel Farage's "full confidence" and that Farage has sent a message of support. "Nigel is just supportive," he said.
- **Context:** Thomas was arrested over the weekend on suspicion of **assault and engaging in controlling or coercive behaviour**, and bailed pending enquiries. He denies doing anything wrong. His resignation broke at the same time as **Sarah Cooper-Lesadd MS** defected from Reform to Plaid Cymru.
- **Analysis (Nation.Cymru, Martin Shipton):** Thomas was Farage's hand-picked Welsh leader, announced out of the blue in February 2026 — "a huge insult to all the members of Reform in Wales who were considered unworthy of the leadership role". Shipton notes nobody voted for Thomas personally: under the closed-list system every Reform MS was elected on Farage's coat-tails, and the party is now discovering the flip side of that.

? Finance Minister to demand a review of Wales' funding deal — summit in Cardiff today

Cabinet Minister for Finance Elin Jones hosts finance ministers from across the UK in Cardiff today (Thursday) and will press Westminster to reopen the 2016 Wales Fiscal Framework, seek greater borrowing powers and argue for changes to the Barnett formula.

- The meeting is the **Finance Inter-ministerial Standing Committee (FISC)**, bringing together UK Government, Welsh, Scottish and Northern Irish finance ministers. Jones will also hold a one-to-one with the **Chief Secretary to the Treasury** focused specifically on Welsh funding.
- The 2016 Fiscal Framework governs the block grant, devolved taxes, borrowing and use of reserves. The Welsh Government wants it reviewed to ensure funding arrangements "remain fit for purpose", plus greater flexibility over reserves to plan long-term investment.
- Jones: **"The way our funding is calculated hasn't kept up with the real needs of people here. It's outdated, and it's not transparent enough. That must change."** She added: "We're up against a genuinely challenging financial backdrop — so what we're asking for isn't about special treatment for Wales but for a system that's fair, that's clear, and one that reflects the needs of our communities."

?? "Disgraceful": Senedd clash over a Welsh-language answer to an English question

A recording of Plaid's culture minister answering an English-language question in Welsh has been viewed tens of thousands of times, dividing opinion online.

- In yesterday's exchange, Conservative MS **Janet Finch-Saunders** (Bangor, Conwy and Môn) asked about Welsh NHS waiting lists **in English**. Trefnydd, Chief Whip and Cabinet Minister for Culture and Sport **Heledd Fychan** replied **in Welsh**.
- Finch-Saunders interrupted: "I did ask the question in English." Fychan responded: **"Yes, and we have two languages here, so I will use the Welsh language to reply to your question. Thank you. Is the interpretation working for the Member now?"**
- The translation system then failed to work, and proceedings were paused while it was checked before Fychan repeated her answer. Nation.Cymru notes no comparable fuss is made when an MS answers in English to a question originally put in Welsh — both languages are official and equal in the Senedd.

? Labour makes Flying Start a budget "red line"

Welsh Labour leader Ken Skates has said his party will not support the Welsh government's budget if cuts are made to the Flying Start early-years programme.

- Skates said the scheme's future "has to be a red line" in ongoing budget talks. Plaid's **Dafydd Iwan Davies**, Minister for Government Effectiveness, did not rule out cutting or changing it: **"I don't think I can guarantee that any single programme will be in its current form."** He praised Flying Start's speech-and-language therapy and health elements and said he wants councils delivering poorly to adopt the best practice of the most effective ones.
- Flying Start, launched in 2007, includes 12.5 hours of free childcare for two-year-olds and is being expanded Wales-wide towards the government's goal of 20 hours a week free childcare for all children aged nine months to four years. The Welsh Government's latest estimate is that this needs **£250m-£500m a year** of extra funding.
- Plaid runs a minority administration and must strike deals in Cardiff Bay to pass budgets or laws. The Welsh Government says support for "disadvantaged children will be enhanced" as childcare expands.

? Defector "was on the verge of expulsion" — and quits a hard-right journal's editorship

Reform UK's director of external affairs has claimed Sarah Cooper-Lesadd was about to be thrown out of the party when she defected to Plaid Cymru — and demanded she quit her Senedd seat.

- **Matthew MacKinnon** posted a long attack on X alleging the Pen-y-bont Bro Morgannwg MS "lied to and manipulated assessors" in her selection, refused to open a constituency office, and "used Reform to get herself elected"; "**She should resign.**" Political commentators seized on his admission that Reform's elected Senedd representatives need **authorisation to speak to the media**.
- There is no legislative requirement for an MS to resign or face a public vote on switching parties. Cooper-Lesadd, 31, was elected under the closed-list system four months ago and accused her former group of wanting the Welsh Government to fail.
- **Separately**, Nation.Cymru reports Cooper-Lesadd has **resigned as editor of the Journal of the Freedom Association**, a post declared on her register of interests (paid £501–£1,000 a year for five to 20 hours a week). The group, founded in 1975, gained prominence through anti-trade-union campaigns, campaigned against sporting sanctions on apartheid-era South Africa — earning a judicial rebuke — and in 1988 threatened the BBC over broadcasting the Nelson Mandela 70th Birthday Tribute.

?? Welsh hospices warn their finances are "fragile"

Hospices across Wales say they face a perfect storm of increasingly urgent and complex care needs, rising costs and growing demand — with one children's hospice chief describing the sector's financial position as "fragile".

- **Wales' hospices provide care and support to 20,000 adults and children every year**, but the sector says pressures on staff and finances are making the situation "difficult to sustain".
- **Irfon Rees**, chief executive of **Tŷ Hafan**, the children's hospice in Bro Morgannwg, said it has had to draw on reserves to keep investing and maintaining services — something "that can't be done in the long term": "About 85% of our care costs are currently covered by the public in Wales, and what we're asking for is a change in that balance." He added: "We welcome the money we get from year to year but we can't plan long-term."
- Running **Tŷ'r Eos in Wrexham** costs about **£5.6m a year**, with roughly **80% of its income coming from fundraising**.

? Powys: consultation dates confirmed for the biggest health shake-up in a generation

Powys Teaching Health Board has confirmed a 14-week consultation from 5 October to 10 January 2027 on proposals that could cut community hospital beds from 146 to 90 across three hospitals, or 60 across two.

- Inpatient wards would be retained in **Brecon** and **Newtown**, with **Llandrindod Wells** potentially staying open only under the three-site model. Beds could be lost at **Welshpool, Machynlleth, Ystradgynlais and Llanidloes** — as well as Llandrindod Wells under the two-site option.
- The board also proposes changes to the location of local urgent care centres and minor injury and illness units, and bringing all mental health inpatient beds together on a single site. Average travel time to inpatient care would rise from about **12 to 24 minutes**, and more than 45 minutes each way for those living furthest away.
- Powys has no general hospital but has beds in eight community hospitals, with occupancy typically 85–90%. Chair **Dr Carl Cooper** said approval of the consultation marked "the beginning of a conversation, not the end of one": **"No outcome has been predetermined."**

? "Call for Concern" rolled out for maternity and neonatal wards

A new route for families to raise urgent concerns about a mother or baby's worsening health is being introduced in hospitals across Wales.

- **Call for Concern** gives women, parents and families a clear way to ask for urgent help — families are often the first to notice something is wrong. It has two parts: recording how a patient is feeling, and a clear route to ask for further clinical review.
- It builds on checks already used by staff, including the all-Wales **Maternity Early Warning Score** and the **Neonatal Early Warning Trigger and Track** tools.

? Every monitored salmon river in Wales is now "at risk"

The latest annual assessment has classified every principal salmon river monitored in Wales as "at risk", with the 2025 season recording the lowest rod catches since records began in 1956.

- Across England and Wales, only **two of the 64 principal salmon rivers** assessed were estimated to have populations above their Conservation Limit.
- **Dr Ben Wilson**, Natural Resources Wales' Principal Fisheries Advisor: **"The picture for salmon in Wales remains deeply concerning. All of our assessed salmon rivers are now classified as 'at risk', and too few salmon are returning from the sea to sustain healthy populations into the future."**
- NRW says Atlantic salmon face pressures throughout their lifecycle — climate change, deteriorating habitats, barriers preventing migration and water quality problems — and that it is working with partners to restore habitats, improve fish passage and strengthen stocks.

? Pylon rethink: 22m "monopoles" aimed at winning over Plaid ministers

Green GEN Cymru has unveiled a new "monopole" pylon design for its Tywi-Usk and Tywi-Teifi projects in mid Wales, in what Nation.Cymru reads as a bid to attract the approval of the new Plaid Cymru Welsh Government.

- The monopoles are around **22 metres tall — roughly half the height of a typical 275kV pylon** — based on a Danish design and created specifically for GGC's developing 132kV network, "with the Welsh landscape in mind". A prototype is expected in early 2027.
- The structures will now be considered alongside wood poles, lattice towers and underground cables in GGC's "infrastructure toolkit", with the company exploring whether they can be manufactured and fabricated in Wales. GGC plans to invest nearly **£1bn** in Wales' electricity network.
- Plaid has made clear its preferred option is **undergrounding** cables. Campaigners at CPRW told the BBC the monopole is "still a major piece of infrastructure in the countryside" (covered in this morning's UK roundup).

? Bangor's Y Glôb seeks a new operator as Wythnos y Glas approaches

Stonegate Pub Company is looking for a new "operator" to run Y Glôb in Upper Bangor — one of the best-known Welsh-language pubs in Wales — which has been closed since June.

- A metal door has been fitted to the main entrance and a notice posted on behalf of the building's owner. A Stonegate spokesperson said the company is "looking forward to welcoming the right operator" and hopes to "reopen the pub as soon as possible".
- The closure has disappointed Welsh-speaking students in Bangor as the new academic year and **Wythnos y Glas** approach — they describe Y Glôb as "a community, not just a pub" and "an important focal point for the social life of the Welsh-speaking community at the university".

The Cardiff pub Y Mochyn Du reopens from today with its Welsh name restored, eight years after a rebrand that caused a row.

- In 2018 the Sophia Close pub switched its "iconic" name for the bilingual **Brewhouse and Kitchen / Bragdy a Chegin** — a move made without consulting the community, many of whom met there, and one that angered Welsh-language campaigners. A refurbishment completing today has given the owners the chance to U-turn.

- **Carol Vorderman is to receive the BAFTA Cymru Siân Phillips Award for Outstanding Contribution**, honouring a decades-long television career that began when she was one of the first women to speak on Channel 4 at 21, plus her STEM campaigning. **Casting director Lauren Evans** is also among this year's special award recipients.

- **John Humphrys asks whether the Royal Family should go on.** The Cardiff-born veteran broadcaster's new Channel 4 documentary *The Royals: Time to Go?* makes the case for electing a head of state. "I know the monarch is not a political leader, but he is our leader, and we need to bow our knee to him. That's what I object to. Shouldn't we get

- **Johns' Boys celebrate 10 years** with two sold-out gala concerts at William Aston Hall in Wrexham on 3 and 4 October — performing with a 37-piece live orchestra for the first time, with a new generation of young singers and their largest UK and Ireland tour to come. ? Bevan switches to fly-half for Wales' WXV opener

Keira Bevan will play at number 10 for the first time when Wales open their WXV Global Series campaign against South Africa at Cardiff Arms Park on Friday.

- The 29-year-old, who has made 83 appearances — all at scrum-half — has been training at fly-half through pre-season and partners **Seren Lockwood**. Regular 10 **Lleucu George** is named among the replacements, with **Kayleigh Powell** already ruled out of the campaign through injury.
- Head coach **Sean Lynn** has named three uncapped players in the matchday squad: **Amy Williams** starts on the wing after a two-try display in June's uncapped Barbarians fixture, while front rowers **Elan Jones** and **Shanelle Williams** are set for first caps from the bench.

Saracens prop Rhys Carre has won the Welsh Rugby Writers' Association's Lloyd Lewis award after playing 11 of Wales' 12 Tests in 2025/26.

- Carre scored in three successive Six Nations matches — against France, Scotland and Ireland — and his solo effort in Dublin was named try of the Championship. He is the **first prop to take the men's award since Gethin Jenkins in 2009**.
- "It's a bit surreal. I didn't think this would be something I could achieve," he said, adding that he still gets stopped about the Ireland try: "There aren't many Welsh people around where I live in St Albans..."

The Ospreys could field a starting XV that is a third Australian when the URC season begins, having recruited from down under out of necessity after May's uncertainty over the club's future.

- Wallabies **Liam Wright**, **Lalakai Foketi** and **Marika Koroibete**, plus fly-half **Lawson Creighton**, have followed lock **Ryan Smith** (signed in 2025 as cover for Adam Beard's move to Montpellier) to west Wales. It is a recruitment drive that has excited supporters after the departures of **Jac Morgan** and **Dewi Lake**.
- The Ospreys open their campaign away to the **Sharks in Durban on Saturday 26 September (15:00 BST)**.

? Leicestershire's points deduction boosts Glamorgan's survival bid

Leicestershire have been deducted 27 points for breaching pitch regulations in their August victory over Glamorgan, leaving them bottom of County Championship Division One and on the brink of relegation.

- The penalty, imposed by the independent Cricket Discipline Panel midway through their penultimate match, effectively hands Glamorgan a lifeline in the fight against the drop. In evidence to the Cricket Regulator, Leicestershire head groundsman **Callum Lewin** cited circumstances "out of my control", including an unscheduled Bollywood filming event at Upton.

- **Councillor falsely claimed a sex offender had been released.** Pyle, Kenfig Hill and Cefn Cribwr councillor **Owain Clatworthy** (Restore Britain) posted a mugshot of **Scott Henwood**, who now uses the name Scarlett Lee, to Facebook on Monday claiming the paedophile had been "released back onto the streets of Bridgend" after serving half of a two-year-four-month sentence. Police confirmed the individual **remains behind bars**; there are calls for him to apologise. *(Nation.Cymru — Emily Price, 17 Sep)*
- **Driver clocked at 144mph on a road crossed by a public footpath.** The speed was recorded on the link road at **Wrexham Industrial Estate** (a 70mph dual carriageway) and emerged during a North Wales Police and Crime Panel briefing on the Compass collision-hotspot mapping scheme. Panel member **Trevor Coxon** said he was "horrified". *(Nation.Cymru — Richard Evans, Local Democracy Reporter, 17 Sep)*
- **Plas Alltyferin, a Grade II-listed country house near Nantgaredig in Carmarthenshire, has gone on the market for £1.6m** — 4,775 sq ft across three floors, more than 100 acres of pasture and woodland along the River Cothi, and its own Norman-era fort. A field at the estate hosted cricket matches through the 1800s. *(Nation.Cymru, 17 Sep)*
- **Restaurant owner fined over cockroach infestation. Motiur Rahman, 51,** of Cardiff, who owned Spice Kitchen Ltd, pleaded guilty at Cardiff Magistrates' Court on 2 September to food hygiene offences. Officers found the Birchgrove premises — then trading as Delhi Cuisine — open during a cockroach infestation after a tip-off in October 2024. It closed voluntarily, later reopened as Grand Sylhet, then shut again when officers found it trading without hot water. *(BBC Wales — Kieran Molloy and Paul Pigott, 16 Sep)*
