Darren Jones is the Labour MP for Bristol North West (2017-present) and Chief Secretary to the Treasury under Keir Starmer. A close Starmer ally and one of the most prominent MPs from Labour's "soft left," Jones was at the centre of leadership speculation in June 2026 when Starmer's allies urged him to run against Andy Burnham — a bid he ultimately declined, endorsing Burnham. A former solicitor specialising in data privacy and cyber-security, Jones rose rapidly through the party: chair of the Business and Trade Select Committee, then Chief Secretary to the Treasury. He has been floated as a possible Chancellor under a Burnham government. Represents the technocratic, pro-business wing of the Labour Party with Fabian Society roots.

Early Life & Education

- Born 1986, raised on the Lawrence Weston council estate, Bristol
- Attended state school
- Studied Human Sciences at university
- Trained as a solicitor
- Worked in-house at BT, specialising in data privacy and cyber-security
- Early involvement with the Fabian Society, the left-leaning think tank that has been a pipeline for Labour frontbenchers

Political Career

Backbench & Select Committee (2017–2024)

- Elected MP for Bristol North West in the 2017 general election, gaining the seat from the Conservatives
- Re-elected in 2019 and 2024
- Built a reputation as a knowledgeable backbencher on technology, data, and business issues
- Served as Chair of the Business and Trade Select Committee, where he gained profile for scrutiny of tech companies, data governance, and trade policy
- Served in shadow ministerial roles under Keir Starmer's leadership

Chief Secretary to the Treasury (2024–present)

- Appointed Chief Secretary to the Treasury in Starmer's government following the 2024 election
- The role is the number two at the Treasury, responsible for public spending, government efficiency, and departmental budgets
- Has been described as one of Starmer's closest and most trusted allies in government
- Positioned himself as a pragmatic, fiscally-disciplined minister aligned with Starmer's "stability and growth" economic message

Leadership Speculation — June 2026

- In the aftermath of Keir Starmer's resignation (June 2026), Jones was at the centre of intense leadership speculation
- **22 June:** The Telegraph reported Starmer allies — including at least one cabinet minister — urged Jones to run against Andy Burnham for the Labour leadership

- **23 June:** The Guardian reported that cabinet ministers loyal to Starmer contacted Jones to encourage a "stop Burnham" candidacy
- **24 June:** Jones publicly declined to run, telling Sky News: *"Andy Burnham is going to be the next prime minister and if there was a contest of Labour Party members, he would win"*
- Bristol24/7 reported Jones had been tipped for a possible leadership bid "in order to prevent newly elected Makerfield MP Andy Burnham from being given the keys to Number 10 unopposed"
- The Mirror quoted Jones warning Labour against "fantasy politics" as the leadership contest unfolded
- Following his withdrawal, speculation shifted to Jones as a possible Chancellor of the Exchequer under Burnham

Political Positions

- **Pro-business, pro-technology:** Background in data privacy and cyber-security informs a technocratic approach to regulation and innovation
- **Fabian Society soft left:** Intellectually rooted in the Fabian tradition — reformist, statist, pro-public services, but pragmatic on markets
- **Starmer loyalist:** Consistently defended Starmer's leadership and economic agenda, warning against internal party division
- **Fiscally cautious:** As Chief Secretary, aligned with Treasury orthodoxy on spending discipline — this positioned him as the "continuity Starmer" candidate against Burnham's more interventionist instincts
- **Expenses controversy:** Criticised online for claiming ~£47,000 in parliamentary expenses, though this is within standard MP allowances given the Bristol-London commute
- **Commons bars defence:** Attracted attention for insisting MPs have the right to drink at Commons bars because they are "office workers" and "not conducting open heart surgery"

Significance & Future Prospects

- Represents the Starmer-loyalist, technocratic wing of the Labour Party that may be marginalised under a Burnham leadership
- His withdrawal from the leadership race and endorsement of Burnham positions him as a potential bridge between the Starmer and Burnham camps
- Floated as possible Chancellor under Burnham — this would represent continuity of Treasury discipline with a Burnham-facing cabinet member
- His Bristol base and working-class origin story give him cross-factional appeal
- At 39–40, has a long career ahead regardless of which faction dominates

Personal Life

- Married to **Lucy Symons-Jones**, a net-zero consultant and technology entrepreneur
- The couple have three daughters
- Lives in Bristol

- **X/Twitter:** @darrenpjones — active, uses platform for constituency updates and ministerial messaging
- **Criticism from left:** Accused by some Labour members of being too close to Starmer and Peter Mandelson (praised Mandelson the day he was fired)
- **Criticism from right:** Targeted by right-wing accounts over expenses and Commons bar comments
- **Bluesky:** Speculation about his future role — some users supportive of Jones as Chancellor under Burnham
- **Re:State Conference (July 2026):** Delivered keynote address alongside Steve Reed at the Re:State conference on government reform
