? Breaking: Starmer Resigns (22 Jun 2026 — Monday)

Keir Starmer resigned as Prime Minister and Labour leader this morning (Mon 22 Jun), making a statement outside 10 Downing Street at ~09:30 BST. Visibly emotional, accompanied by his wife Victoria, he confirmed:

“I have heard the answer of my parliamentary party to that question, and I accept that answer with good grace. Every decision I've taken has been about putting the country I love first. That is why I will resign as leader of the Labour party.”

Key Details from the Statement

- **Phone call to the King** — Starmer spoke to Charles at Highgrove this morning to inform him of his resignation
- **Staying on as caretaker** — He will remain PM until Labour chooses a new leader
- **Timeline** — Has asked the NEC (National Executive Committee) to ensure a new leader is in place **before Parliament returns in September**
- **If Burnham is unopposed** — New PM could take over by **mid-July**
- **If there's a contest** — New PM by **end of August**

- **Endorsed no one** — Said he'd support whoever succeeds him
- **Emotional sign-off** — *"Being the best husband I can, to my fantastic wife Vic... and being the best dad I can to my beautiful children"* — fighting back tears

What Happens Now

1. **Starmer remains caretaker PM** — no immediate handover
2. **NEC sets rules/timetable** — nominations open **9 July**
3. **Andy Burnham** — the overwhelming favourite. Being sworn in as MP for Makerfield today
4. **Wes Streeting has backed Burnham** and ruled himself out (22 Jun) — coronation now highly likely
5. **If Burnham is unopposed** → new PM by ~**16 July** (Commons recess start)
6. **If contested** → ballot over summer, new PM by **end of August**
7. **General election?** — Burnham hasn't ruled out a snap election, but most commentators expect 2027 at earliest. Reform UK demanding one.

The Contest

Trigger

Over **95 Labour MPs** called for Starmer to resign or set a timetable. The crisis culminated in today's resignation. Formal leadership election now triggered.

Five ministers/aides resigned: Wes Streeting (Health), John Healey (Defence), Al Carns (MoD junior), Pamela Nash (MoD aide), Jess Phillips (junior minister) + 3 others.

- Being sworn in as MP today (22 Jun) — his first day in Parliament
- High chance of **uncontested coronation** if Streeting/Rayner/Lammy stand aside

- Former Health Secretary, resigned 14 May
- **22 Jun: Ruled himself out** of leadership contest, endorsed Burnham
- Statement: Burnham's Makerfield win was "*a victory for unity and hope over division and hatred*"
- Had previously insisted several times he would challenge
- Right of party, seen as continuation of Starmerism

Angela Rayner

- Strong member support (11% in polling)

- Rumoured as potential caretaker PM but Burnham's ascendancy makes that unlikely

David Lammy

- Foreign Secretary

- Initially backed Starmer (5 Jun: "would fight in a contest")
- Went quiet over the weekend — position unclear
- Reports say he's now also told Starmer to resign

Shabana Mahmood

- Justice Secretary
- Potential centre-left candidate
- Determined to remain Home Secretary (per The Times)

Ed Miliband

- Energy Security Secretary, former leader (2010-2015)
- Limited support for return — "been there" factor
- Talked about as potential Chancellor under Burnham

Al Carns

- Former MoD junior minister (resigned 20 Jun)
- Potentially angling for a run on defence credentials

The resignation was the #1 story globally. The **afternoon sweep** revealed a shift from news-sharing to **reaction and positioning** as the day developed.
