Status	Confirmed: Saturday 12 September, 12 midday, Tamworth train station (B79 7JT). Announced on BF Telegram 6 July 2026 (18:01), cross-posted to X, website video 7 July.
Target area	Tamworth, West Midlands — NOT Coventry or Leicester as earlier polling suggested. Matt Capon's 21 June poll was overtaken by the Tamworth decision.
Previous	Birmingham 20 June (~200 turnout, down from ~400 at Manchester in Feb)

Notes	BF frame Tamworth as "a patriot stronghold that has been plagued by migrant hotels and even migrant rapes" (BF website, 7 July). TG has been active since 29 June — contrary to earlier assessment of "quiet" — with visits to Wethersfield, Barnham, and Bicester MoD asylum sites. BF's "No one does it like Britain First. Our next event will be even more spectacular!" (TG, 1 July) suggests they see Tamworth as a reboot after Birmingham's poor showing. One supporter already confirmed booking a hotel for the 12th.

Counter-protest	Stand Up To Racism + Women Against The Far Right counter-rally — 11am, McLennan Arch, Glasgow Green — same location, same day. Supported by UCU and Refuweegee. SUTR statement: "The fascist group 'Unite the Clans Scotland' have announced a demonstration in Glasgow on 25th July and invited the likes Britain First to join them. We say no to racism, division and hatred! No Pasaran!" (The National, 12 July 2026)
Background	The rally comes after several days of anti-immigration disorder in Glasgow — crowds gathered in Cranhill, Castlemilk and Royston after social media posts were spread on far-right pages about alleged sexual assaults. Police Scotland said misinformation was being spread by bad actors, often from outside Glasgow. Five police officers were injured during the protests. Anti-racism groups accused far-right actors of using "horrific attacks on women to infiltrate local communities to build their far right street movement".
Britain First invited	Unite the Clans invited Britain First to join the 25 July rally (The National, 12 July 2026 — via SUTR statement).
Notes	A Scottish-specific far-right group, distinct from Tommy Robinson's Unite the Kingdom. Their first Edinburgh rally was counter-protested heavily. Glasgow Green rally is their second attempt. The counter-protest significantly raises the stakes — both sides mobilising.

Counter-protest	Small but noisy counter-demonstration heckled the march along its route, providing "rather more energy than the Pink Ladies themselves managed to muster" (Searchlight)
Arrests	None reported
Promotion	Tommy Robinson Telegram pushed it (post 66365 on the day: "We are covering the @pinkladies_uk demo in Dover today")

What happened:

- The march set off from the **Golden Lion** pub (the local fascists' favourite watering hole) before winding down to a "desultory, shouty rally on Shakespeare Beach"
- Organisational incompetence on display — speakers had to **climb on a wall** to address the crowd because no platform was hired
- The result of weeks of buildup was "somewhere between 100 and 150 attendees, and could easily be contained within a single decent-sized pub garden" (Searchlight)
- **Contradicts earlier assessments:** Previously described by Searchlight (May) as "clearly much better organised" than usual Kent far-right demos — the reality was more amateurish

- Orla Minihane's Deloitte background did not translate to organisational competence on the ground
- The promised "hundreds" and framing around "2,000 MEN" did not materialise

Theme	Anti-migrant / "Raise the Flags" — flag-display campaign expanding into a march
Turnout	~ 100 far-right (Searchlight). Comfortably outnumbered 3:1 by ~300 anti-fascist counter-demonstrators
White Vanguard	Attended without balaclavas — apparently deciding showing their faces is "a risk worth taking"
Ryan Ferguson	Attended, was asked to leave by march organisers + local Reform UK chairman to maintain decorum. Ferguson told them to "fuck off". Later brawled with a rival anti-migrant contingent bussed in from Wrexham after calling them "sheep shaggers"
Arrests	None — Ferguson "managed, for once, not to get arrested" (Searchlight)

Key details:

- Described by Searchlight as "a heavily-promoted Raise the Flags demonstration" that pulled only a small crowd, "but included a noisy bunch of neo-nazis and a hugely entertaining fist fight"
- Ferguson's brawl with the Wrexham contingent was the highlight — "no matter how thin the ideological differences, the far right can always be relied upon to find a reason to fight amongst themselves"
- The Shrewsbury demo and the Dover Pink Ladies demo happened the same weekend — Searchlight covered both as "Two marches, but in reality a couple of noisy pub crawls dressed up as a political movement"
- Wrexham Unite subsequently announced "**Protest Number Four**" — details TBA, described as "going back to the original plan from the first protest"

Arrests	Unconfirmed — no MSM reporting on arrests at this specific demo. But the protest was notable for far-right internal violence: White Vanguard chased off, Aryan Front activist mobbed and unmasked (see Searchlight below).

Key details:

- March from Crewe town centre (Municipal Buildings) to Webb House, the HQ of the Ahmadi Religion of Peace and Light (AROPL)
- Webb House was raided by **500+ police in April 2026** — 12 arrested for alleged serious sexual offences, modern slavery, forced marriage
- Since the raid: nightly protests, **arson attacks** (fireworks, attempted fire on 6 June), **9 arrests** for disorder, dispersal orders repeatedly imposed
- Tommy Robinson **supporters** have been involved in previous protests at the site
- **Ryan Ferguson** (known far-right activist/streamer) was arrested at a previous Webb House protest after harassing a 5Pillars journalist
- Multiple accounts from outside the area attending — "travelled from down south"
- Right-wing framing: some accounts pushing "Muslim armies mobilising in Crewe" narrative against AROPL

? Internal Far-Right Drama (Searchlight, 29 June)

The 27 June protest became a **rolling spectacle of factional score-settling** reported by Searchlight as "Shirts off, masks off, gloves off: neo-nazis spark war on the far right":

- **White Vanguard (Kai Cunningham)** turned up, were swiftly told to leave, retreated to a nearby park where they took their shirts off, posed for photos and performed litter-picking for the camera
- **Aryan Front's "MD"** (the same masked neo-nazi who confronted Golding in Maidstone) appeared and was instantly mobbed. A large crowd, including far-right auditors, ripped off his mask and jostled him down the street. MD later claimed he "took a few good punches" though video shows more shoving than striking
- **Paul Golding** posted footage of MD being unmasked, calling him a "neo-Nazi prick". The tweet lasted less than 24 hours — deleted after a furious backlash accusing Golding of "doxxing", "traitor behaviour" and siding with "civ-nats" against "true nationalists"
- **Ashlea Simon** (All for England, Golding's ex-partner) condemned the "mob mentality chasing a lone White lad"
- **White Vanguard's Cunningham** calling Golding "Goldstein", demanded he "stop hiding"
- **MD himself** raged that the protest was "full of browns, mulattos and kikes"
- **Dean Phillpott** (Kent Nationalist Movement) called the crowd's behaviour "embarrassing"
- Aryan Front and National Rebirth Party activists denounced Britain First as "race traitors", "Zionist civ-nats" and "shills"

Background — AROPL:

- The Ahmadi Religion of Peace and Light is a religious group based at Webb House, a Grade II-listed former orphanage
- April 2026: Cheshire Police executed warrants, arresting 12. Allegations of sexual offences, modern slavery, forced marriage
- Seven of those arrested had interim anti-slavery orders imposed
- 25 people charged with obstruction during the police raid
- Bitter Winter (religious liberty magazine) describes the protests as "racist riots and violence fueled by sensationalist media, fake news, and propaganda"

Key details:

- Return match after Bob's first Manchester attempt where multiracial school kids chased him off
- Arrived with hired muscle (Fred Willis), a gazebo, and a new banner "Project Britannia, Cross and Corner"
- One Bobbite threatened to "kill you all" while pointing at three female anti-racists
- **Pornography scandal:** This week it emerged Bob has a problem with pornography, spending online donations on Pornhub and XHamster
- New nickname circulating in far-right circles: "Young Grass" (after his Southampton footage helped convict rioters), "Bob the Plod", "Policeman Bob"
- Rupert Lowe under pressure to distance Restore Britain from the Bobbites — Daily Mail noting Restore Britain is "riddled with Nazis"

Britain First leader Paul Golding visited the base on 27 June (per TG), posting a video "earmarked for illegal immigrant invaders" — scouting potential protest locations.

First Minister John Swinney: "The scenes we saw in Glasgow, Edinburgh and Ayr are unacceptable... Racism, hatred and intimidation have no place in Scotland."

Reform UK's Grant Calder (suspended for antisemitic remarks) wrote "Hurrah for the blackshirts" alongside lightning/eagle emoji and Oswald Mosley image.

Context	Houston's YouTube channel has amplified footage of the "silent protest" fascist-style gatherings of up to 60 men in black outside Holyrood (24 June) and Glasgow Cathedral (18 June). One gathering marked the anniversary of the murder of Kriss Donald.

Detail	Info
Associate	Sandy Chugg — former Rangers casual with prior convictions for street violence and drugs offences — has admitted taking part in the fascist-style events. Houston says he had no role in organising them.
Restore Britain	Party has not commented publicly.
Significance	First time a Restore Britain activist linked to the "blackshirt" protests has been detained under terrorism legislation. Sets a major precedent for how police treat far-right street mobilisation in Scotland.

- Golding now cosplaying as Reform leader — turquoise tie
- Bar **Cherry Reds** refused to serve BF supporters, got review-bombed
- West Midlands Police investigated video of officer "punching female protester"
- Shabana Mahmood (Home Secretary/Birmingham MP) pledged "full force of the law"
- Golding and **White Vanguard neo-nazi Kai Cunningham** were both scheduled to attend a Maidstone demo the week before (see 13 June)

White Vanguard as a "Fake homosexual 'Nazi' group trying to grab 2 seconds of fame." Both were at the same Maidstone demo — Searchlight speculated about a possible clash.

In a curious twist, Tommo informed police he was of **"no fixed abode" (NFA)** — though Searchlight possesses documents showing his actual current address (related to the sinking of his anti-migrant speedboat in Littlehampton). Tommo posted a video of his charge sheet to social media after release from custody. The picture that emerged is of a man under significant pressure and "starting to unravel" (Searchlight, 12 July).

Trends

- **Numbers are shrinking across the board** — Britain First dropped from ~400 (Manchester, Feb) to ~200 (Birmingham, June). Pink Ladies couldn't break 150 in Dover despite weeks of hype. Shrewsbury drew ~100. Unite the Kingdom's second march was smaller than the first. Young Bob couldn't draw a crowd.
- **The Pink Ladies hype bubble burst** — previously described as "clearly much better organised", the 4 July Dover demo was a damp squib. No platform hired. Speakers climbing walls. 100-150 people after weeks of "2,000 MEN" framing. Searchlight's "triple vision" diagnosis for the 400-claim was brutal.
- **Internal feuds now outpace the protests themselves** — Crewe (27 June) became a farce: White Vanguard chased off, Aryan Front's MD unmasked and mobbed. Shrewsbury (4 July): Ryan Ferguson brawling with Wrexham contingent after calling them "sheep shaggers". Golding's "doxxing" tweet deleted within 24 hours after backlash. The far right's civil war is now the main event, not the marches.
- **Raise the Flags / Wrexham Unite emerging as new players** — the Shrewsbury demo connected multiple regional groups (Shrewsbury, Wrexham, Wolverhampton, Cannock Chase, Kingstanding). Wrexham Unite's "Protest Number Four" announcement suggests they're serious about sustained mobilisation. Worth watching.
- **Britain First has a date and place** — Tamworth announced for 12 September (not the Coventry/Leicester options being polled in June). TG has been active with MoD site visits

(Wethersfield, Barnham, **Bicester**). "No one does it like Britain First. Our next event will be even more spectacular!" suggests a reboot narrative after Birmingham's poor showing. Whether Tamworth draws better numbers than Birmingham's ~200 remains to be seen.

- **Danny Tommo facing criminal trial** — charged with 5 offences on 7 July including aggravated trespass for filming asylum seekers despite a port ban. Told police he was "no fixed abode" (Searchlight has his address). Court in August, risks up to 6 months.
- **Craig Houston detained under Terrorism Act** — Glasgow Restore Britain activist who amplified "blackshirt"-style fascist protests stopped at Edinburgh Airport under Schedule 7. Devices seized. First Restore Britain member detained under terror legislation. Precedent-setting for far-right street mobilisation in Scotland.
- **BF scouting all three new MoD asylum sites** — BF has now visited RAF Barnham, RAF Wethersfield, and **Bicester** (announced 25-26 June as new asylum accommodation sites). Pattern suggests they may pivot from city-centre marches to site-specific protests at migrant accommodation.
- **Wrexham Unite expanding** — still active with Welsh flags controversy and a "music project" anti-migrant song going viral in Northern Ireland. "Protest Number Four" still TBA.
- **Counter-protests consistently dwarf the far right** — 3:1 in Shrewsbury, 500+ vs 200 in Birmingham, 500K vs "tens of thousands" in London, 5:1 in Tower Hamlets. The pattern is consistent.
- **No UTK #3 on the horizon** — Tommy Robinson has pivoted to daily Telegram content and promoting other people's demos (Pink Ladies Dover) rather than organising his own. His "organiser begs Farage to unite with 'treasonous wretch' Rupert Lowe" (Searchlight headline) suggests internal UTK disarray.
- **The Reform UK / far-right demo crossover grows** — Reform UK chairman involved in asking Ryan Ferguson to leave the Shrewsbury demo. Rupert Lowe under pressure over Bobbites. The line between "political party" and "marching movement" continues to blur.
- **Scotland has its own far-right ecosystem** — separate from the England-based groups. "Unite the Clans Scotland" (Rally 2 on 25 July, Glasgow Green, 44.6K Facebook followers) is distinct from Tommy Robinson's UTK. Craig Houston's Restore Britain-linked fascist-style demonstrations in Glasgow (18 June), Edinburgh (24 June) and Aberdeen introduced Italian Blackshirt/Nazi symbolism to Scottish streets. **Houston detained under Terrorism Act at Edinburgh Airport (12 July)** — devices seized, released without charge. Associate Sandy Chugg (former Rangers casual) admitted taking part. The 9 June "White Lives Matter" protest drew hundreds, 3 arrests, and racist graffiti. Arbroath (20 June) had disorder with 1 arrest and a counter-protest from "Angus for All". First Minister Swinney and Scottish Labour leader Sarwar both condemned the violence. Additional anti-immigration disorder in Glasgow (Cranhill, Castlemilk, Royston) spread via far-right social media — **5 police injured**, misinformation from outside Glasgow.
- **Wales: Wrexham Unite under scrutiny** — a North Wales Police panel member said he felt "afraid" at their demonstrations (16 June 2026). Wrexham Unite rejected the claims as "not true" and insisted protests were "family-friendly". Report by PCC Andy Dunbobbins confirmed anti-immigration protests continued through early 2026 and hate crime rose 5%. Wrexham Unite's "Protest Number Four" still TBA.
- **Geographic spread is widening** — now includes Glasgow, Edinburgh, Aberdeen, Arbroath, Greenock, Ayr, Wrexham. Scotland and Wales are now hosting their own distinct far-right activity, not just piggybacking English groups.
